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1. Feedback Survey Report (2023-2024)

Vivekananda College is a constituent part of the University of Delhi. The college had been accredited with “A” grade in the first cycle of NAAC accreditation. It was setup in 1970 in Gandhi Nagar by the Delhi Administration (now the govt. of NCT of Delhi) from the grants received by the UGC and Delhi Administration with an objective to provide opportunities for higher education to women in the Trans- Yamuna area. The college now attracts students from all across the country to study various undergraduate level and postgraduate (currently Hindi and Sanskrit) level programs. We aim for excellence in academics, co-curricular activities, and an overall growth of our students. The IQAC committee of the college makes consistent efforts in order to ensure quality measures are promoted and adopted in all the domains of the institution. 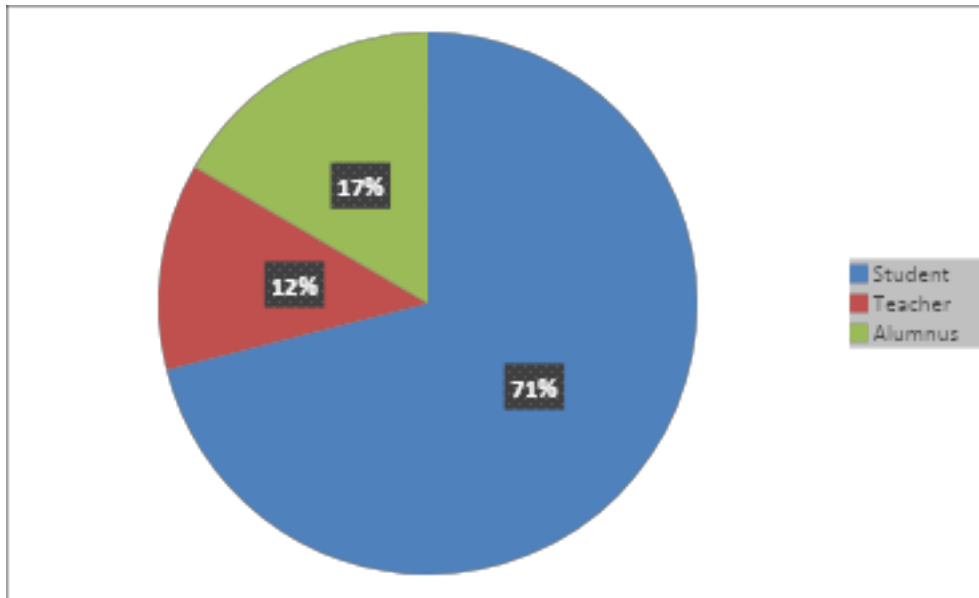
Overall Sample Size:

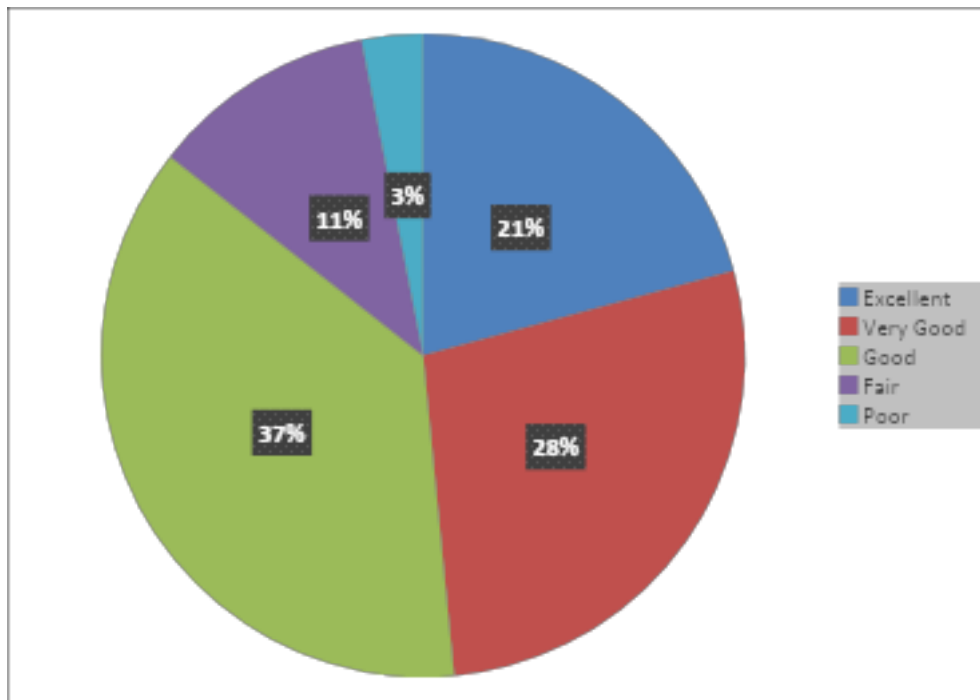

3.1 Clarity of course objectives

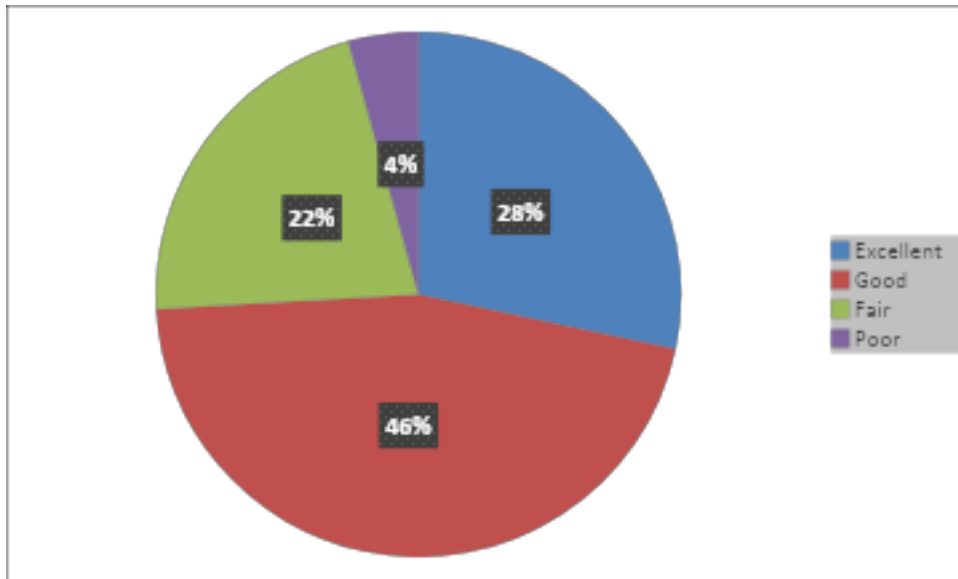

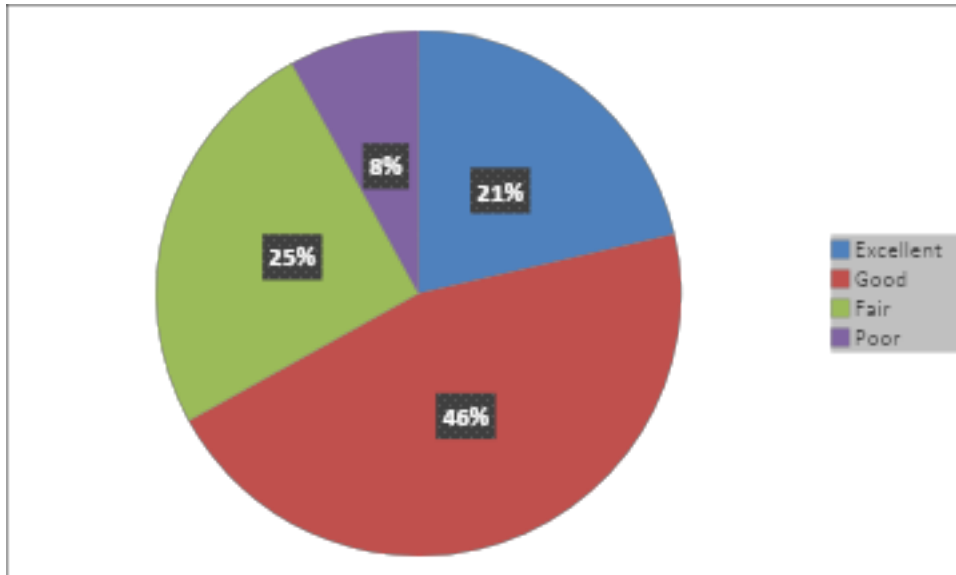

3.3 Curriculum balances theoretical and practical knowledge

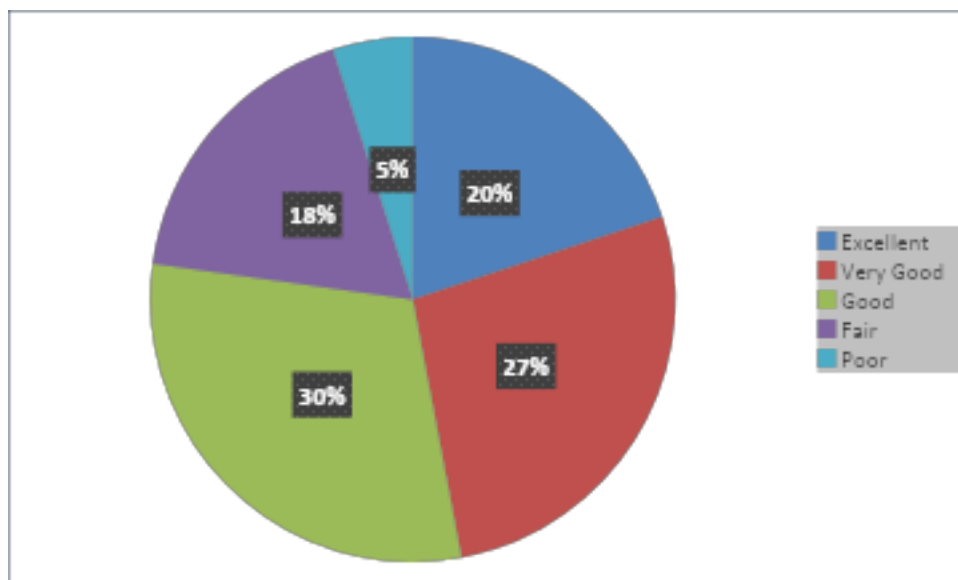

3.4 Extent to which the course generates interest in subject areas

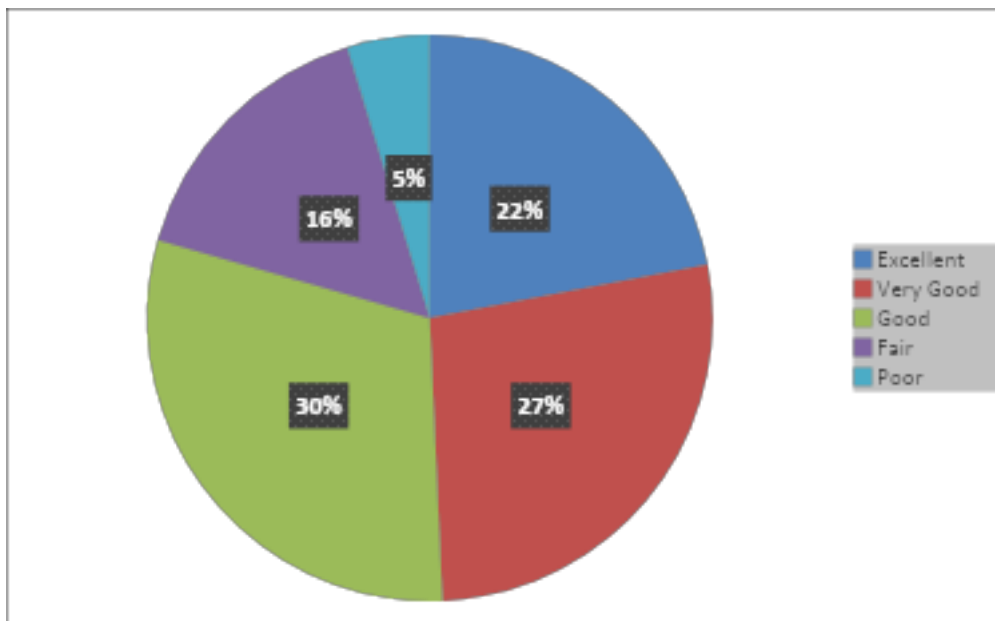

3.5 Depth of course content

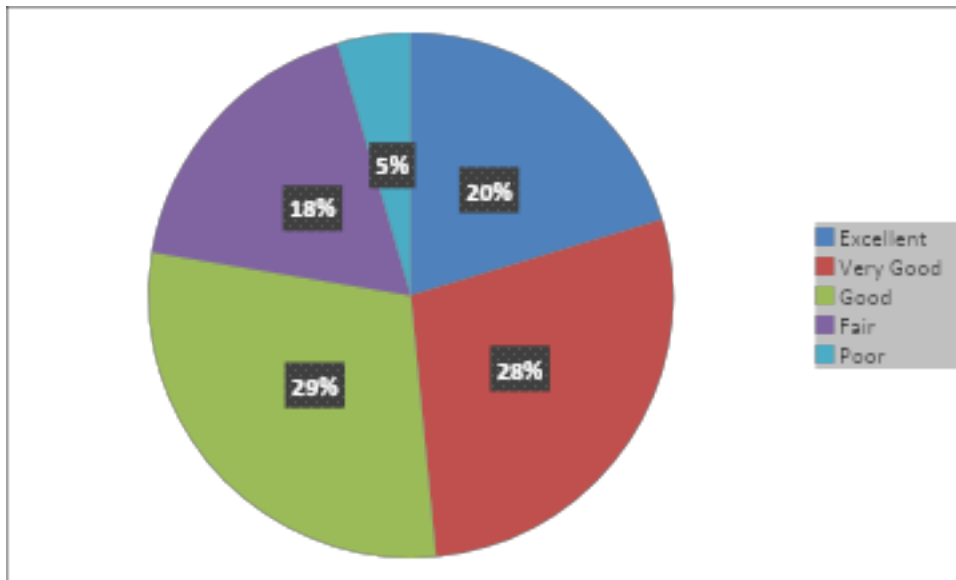

3.6 Relevance of course content to real life

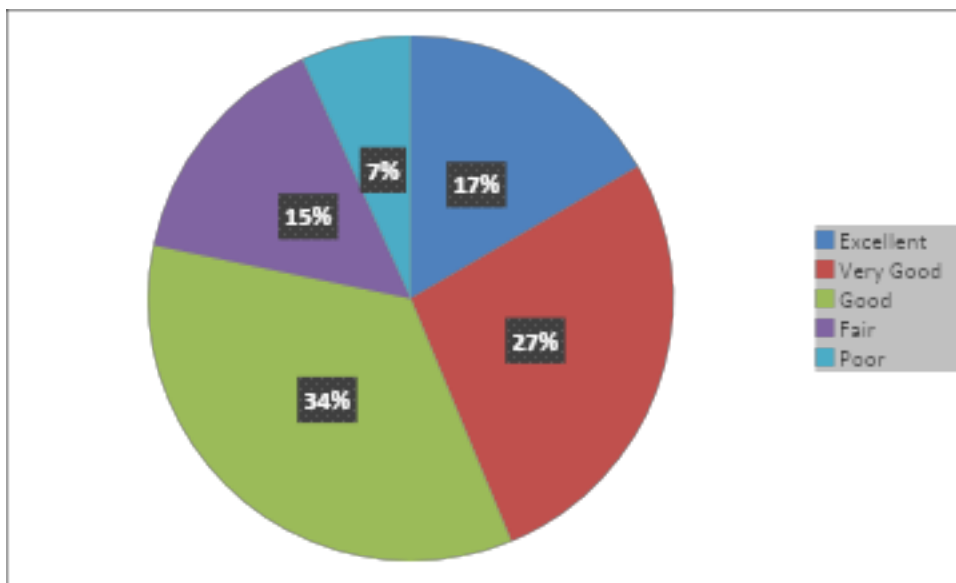

3.7 Method of assessment of students' performance

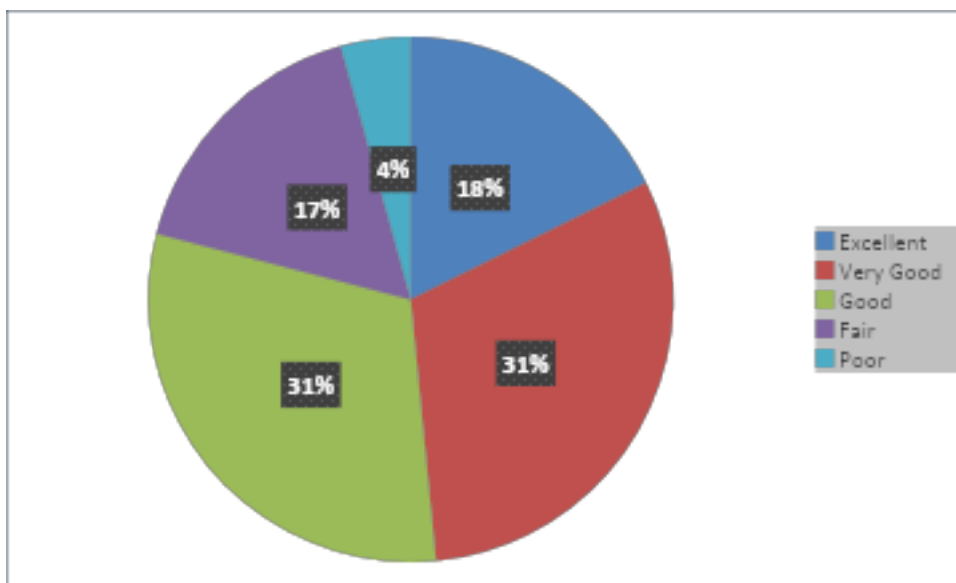

3.8 Ability of the course to foster higher learning

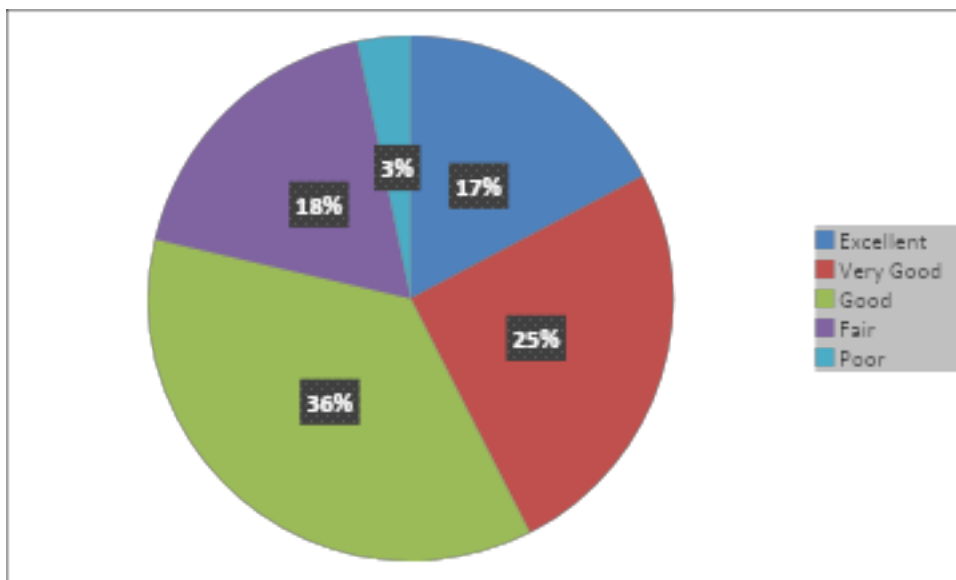

3.9 Adequacy of suggested references

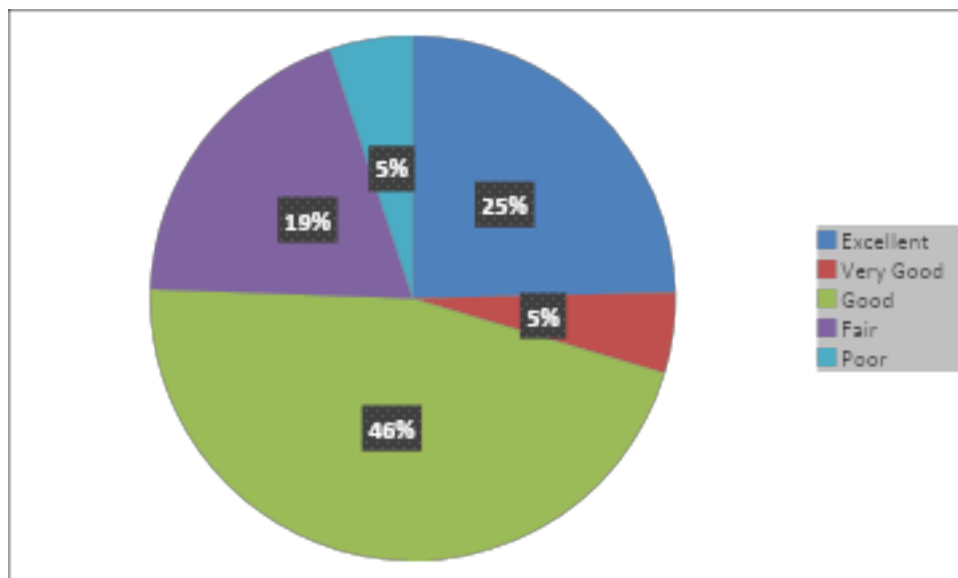

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4. Action taken report on feedback: 2023-2024

1. While students receive briefings on course objectives, it's crucial for teachers to allocate more time to clearly convey this information. This will be accomplished through orientations, mentor-mentee sessions, classroom discussions, and tutorials.
2. Courses should focus on increasing student engagement by utilizing innovative pedagogical approaches such as experiential learning and Problem-Based Learning (PBL). These methods will challenge students with real-world issues while emphasizing the ongoing integration of technology. The college will continue to invest in technological advancements.
3. It is essential to enrich course materials. Teachers will be incentivized to thoroughly review existing content, identifying areas for expansion and incorporating advanced concepts. Feedback mechanisms will be established with the university to facilitate this process. Additionally, training sessions and seminars will be organized to broaden teachers' knowledge and promote teaching strategies that include real-world case studies, cutting-edge research, and industry insights. Continuous updates to library resources will also be prioritized.
4. Teachers will be encouraged to align instructional materials with practical examples, case studies, and scenarios specific to the industry. There will be an increase in field visits and a stronger emphasis on securing more internship opportunities for students.
5. To enhance the adequacy of suggested references, it is vital to collect feedback from students regarding their preferred types of resources. Consulting with industry experts will help refine the reference list. Furthermore, seminars and conferences will be organized where experts can discuss new research and share valuable resource information.
